License Plate Goes to East Tennessee - 400 Miles from the Site of a Civil War Disaster




A battlefield preservationist visits the Sultana Monument - Knoxville's memorial to America's deadliest maritime disaster.



A crowd of paroled prisoners covers the deck of the Sultana a day before her destruction. More died in this tragedy on the Mississippi River than in the sinking of the Titanic years later.

S.S. Sultana was a double decker sidewheel steamboat. Although designed with a capacity of only 376 passengers, the boat was loaded at Vicksburg with more than 2200 Union POWs released from prison camps in Alabama and Georgia, heading home at the end of the War. At 2 AM on April 27, 1865, three of the boat's four boilers exploded causing the boat to burn and sink near Memphis. Hundreds of the men who died and dozens who survived were members of the Third Tennessee (U.S.) Cavalry and residents of the Knoxville area. In 1916, Sultana survivors unveiled the only monument to the victims in the Mt. Olive Cemetery on Old Maryville Pike in Knoxville.


